Other Ways to Recycle Your Tree

If you use Pacific Disposal's yard debris pickup service, cut your tree into 3-foot sections and place it in, or next to, your yard-waste container on your normal collection day.

If you live outside the Lacey city limits* or miss the pick-up day, you can take your tree, free of charge, to the Thurston County Waste & Recovery Center (2420 Hogum Bay Road NE, Lacey) December 26 - January 16 (closed January 1). Open Monday - Friday, 7 a.m. – 4:45 p.m. and Saturday & Sunday, 8 a.m. – 4:45 p.m.

RE-OPENING EVENT CELEBRATES LACEY VETERANS SERVICES HUB EXPANSION

The Lacey Veterans Services Hub continues to make a difference in the lives of many Veterans due to its dedicated group of creative and supportive community partners and volunteers.

The Lacey Veterans Services Hub (Hub) held a grand re-opening event in November 2021 to celebrate the recent completion of the 8,000-square-foot facility update and expansion.

The Hub is a "one-stop" facility for Veterans to access benefits, employment, education, housing, counseling, healthcare, and more. Since its opening in 2016, there has been an overwhelming demand for services. The Hub, which started with 18 service providers, now includes over 80+ community partners. Hub service providers held over 7,000 client appointments in 2019 alone! To help meet the growing demand and need for additional space, the City was able to use local money, and secure state and federal dollars, to fund the much-need facility expansion.

Expanded Facility Highlights

The building's exterior received many improvements, including new siding, windows, and roof. In addition, a number of exterior and interior energy-efficiency features were added that will keep the Hub operating for many years to come.

The Hub, located on the building's first floor, now has over 4,000 square feet of space that includes:

- A renovated lobby.
- 16 office and meeting spaces, including 4 telehealth offices.
- · A large conference room.
- A break room for staff and volunteers.
- A food pantry, in partnership with the Lacey Food Band, that is open to the community.

CITY OF LACEY 2022 BUDGET HIGHLIGHTS

The 2022 Budget serves as the City's guiding policy document outlining City priorities and how finite public resources are spent to provide essential services to our community.

The 2022 Budget was adopted with a sense of optimism of a return to normal with the inclusion of near pre-pandemic Parks, Culture, and Recreation program levels, and lodging-tax-funded community and tourism-related events. At the same time, a continued careful approach was taken with revenue projections and growth to ongoing expenditures. Due, in large part, to the strength of past planning and fiscal policies, the 2022 Budget continues to invest in quality of life improvements, maintain infrastructure maintenance and repair levels, provide for necessary construction, and plan for the community's future.
